Sweepstakes Fraud

What is Sweepstakes Fraud?

YOU'VE WON!!! Those are magical words to many people who dream of winning an exotic vacation, a new car or thousands of dollars in cash. Unfortunately, in many instances those promises of big give-aways are scams in which consumers nationwide lose billions of dollars each year.

A 1992 survey commissioned by the National Consumers League found that 92 percent of adults had at one time or another received a postcard or letter in the mail informing them that they had won "free prizes." Nearly one-third or 54 million people responded to those offers, and less than 20 percent of those received their prizes without buying products or paying fees.

BE AN INFORMED CONSUMER, KNOW YOUR RIGHTS!

Louisiana law provides consumers with the following rights:

Contest sponsors must disclose to consumers in writing if the consumer is required to submit to a sales presentation before they may claim their award. The disclosure must contain a full description of the prize or gift, all terms and conditions attached to the prize, a statement that the consumer is required to submit to a sales presentation, a full description of the product being offered for sale, and a consumer's right-to-cancel provision.

Any contract in excess of 500.00 which results from a transaction in which the consumer is required to submit to a sales presentation in order to claim a prize may be canceled any time before midnight of the third business day after the contract is signed.

Tips to Avoid Becoming a Victim of Sweepstakes Fraud

AVOID SCAMS: Hang up the phone on solicitors or throw away notifications which require upfront money to get "guaranteed prizes."

DO NOT CALL A "900" NUMBER TO CLAIM YOUR FREE PRIZE! Shady sweepstakes promoters earn millions of dollars in profits by requiring consumers to call costly "900" numbers to claim their prize. Don't fall victim to this marketing technique.

IF IT SOUNDS TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE, IT PROBABLY IS! Remember, if you've won a prize, then it is yours for *free*!
